School Absences

It is the parent/guardian's responsibility to explain his/her child's absence by written notice on the first day of the child's return to school. All notes should be turned into the teacher within 3 days of returning.



Reading Round-up

Now that the Independent Reading Level Assessment (IRLA) has been administered to all students, your child has been assigned a reading level and power goal. This reading level is important, as it is your child's independent reading level, or what your child can do on his own. Power goals are unique to each student. Please be sure to ask your child what his/her power goal might be and encourage practice during your reading time at home.

Reading at home will make a huge difference in your child's school success. Here are some tips for building strong readers:

- ✓ Make reading part of your everyday routine (20-30 min.).
- Read anything and everything- from books to street signs!
- ✓ Point out and discuss new vocabulary words.

- ✓ Encourage your child to "read" the illustrations or pictures.
- \checkmark Take a trip to a library or bookstore.
- \checkmark Ask questions about what was read.
- ✓ Help your child fall in love with books and reading.

Nurse's Note Here's to your health!



Top 10 <u>WARNING SIGNS</u> OF VISION PROBLEMS IN CHILDREN

Blurry vision may be interfering with your child's ability to learn in school. Regular eye exams can detect and correct this and other vision problems.

Parents, as well as teachers, should be aware of these 10 signs that a child's vision needs correction:

- 1- Consistently sitting too close to the TV or holding a book too close.
- 2- Losing his/her place or using a finger to guide eyes when reading.
- 3- Squinting or tilting the head to see better.
- 4- Frequent eye rubbing.
- 5- Sensitivity to light and/or excessive tearing.
- 6- Closing one eye to read or watch TV to see better.
- 7- Avoiding activities that require near vision, such as reading or homework, or distance vision, such as participating in sports or other recreational activities.
- 8- Frequent headaches or tired eyes.
- 9- Avoidance of computer use because it "hurts" the eyes.
- 10-Receiving lower grades than usual.

Counselors' Connection

We are so excited to be focusing on Character Education at WES this year! Each month, we will be celebrating a specific character trait through daily classroom activities and monthly character lessons. During the month of September, Woodland will be celebrating respect. Your child will be learning what respect means through numerous activities. Outlined below, you will see our topics for each week:

- Week 1: Defining Respect
- Week 2: Listening to Others
- Week 3: Speaking Kindly
- Week 4: Being Fair, Playing Fair, Sharing & ٠ **Taking Turns**

Please talk with your child at home about what he or she has learned. Additionally, in order to further solidify some of the skills your child is learning, please see some activities that you can do at home.

Suggested Activities:

- a. Take some time to listen carefully to what your child has to tell you. Show him or her to be a good listener. Point out to your child when he or she is being a good listener and how you can tell (i.e. "I could tell you were listening because you stopped what you were doing and looked at me.").
- b. Make a game of giving compliments to different family members. Look through family photo albums together and say only kind things about family members in the photos.
- c. When watching a video or TV show, point out examples of people saying kind or unkind things.
- d. Talk with your child about his or her day and have your child tell you some examples

of kind and unkind actions or words by others. Then, talk about actions or words your child did or said that were kind or unkind.

- e. Play a game with your child and talk about the importance of playing by the rules and taking turns.
- f. "Catch" your child being good. Recognize when your child is being respectful and praise him or her for it.

Respect is such an important social skill that is essential for a successful future. Thank you for allowing us at Woodland to be part of your child's future.
